The program for this month is:

Interference to Ham Radio Reception by Personal Computer Equipments

A radio amateur since 1952, Dave is a graduate of the University of Redlands in Physics in 1956. He has worked in electronic related fields which have seen the transistor and microcomputer come into being. He is currently employed by MICOM Communications Corp., in Simi Valley, CA and is responsible for compliance of their computer based electronic equipment to meet FCC interference requirements. Author of the Electronic Technician Workbook Series, he also teaches electronic technician training at West Valley Occupational Center of Los Angeles Unified School District.

Computers and other non-radio equipment are not intended to transmit radio signals of any kind. Within the modern personal computer, electrical signals are changing at such a fast rate that considerable radio signals are produced.

This electromagnetic incomparability can cause serious interference to the receiving equipment used by amateur radio operators. This presentation will present the typical radio interference generated by the average

personal computer. Spectrum analysis will be used to demonstrate the characteristics of the interference. Practical methods to reduce the effects of this interference will be discussed.

Time To Take Out The Trash

I was given a piece of advice the other day that made me angry. The advice was offered by one of my co-workers. He had told me that when I am ever working in the field and are accosted by strangers armed or otherwise, that I should just give them money and that would make them go away. The thought of this made me bristle. Thoughts of individual liberties and standing up for one's self were the first to enter my mind. After some reflection however, I started to think about the larger picture. Just how is it that we as a people began to think this way. Just give the would be robbers some money and they will leave you alone. What an absurd notion. They don't even need a weapon to take our money from us. We have been advised to submit to this kind of aggression from the time we began in school.

The school bully takes your lunch money and you are advised to do nothing. If you fight back, school authorities will not distinguish you from your attacker. You will be punished by the school the same as the bully who robbed you.

So what does all of this have to do with the average ham. Do you think that we don't suffer

similar circumstances within our own hobby? I ask you to consider an issue that exists within ham radio. For lack of a better description I will use the term "Trash operators" These are the operators that jam your QSO. These are the people who scream obscenities over the air. These people are giving the rest of Ham Radio a bad name. These people are a cancer, spreading throughout Ham Radio.

Conventional wisdom has told us that "If we leave them alone, they will stay on their own repeater and not bother us. This has proven to be wrong. These trash operators are indeed expanding their turf to more repeaters. They seem to gravitate towards high level repeaters. It most likely makes them feel more secure because of the anonymity of repeaters with large coverage areas. Most of us have tuned into one of those repeaters at one time or another. We do so out of curiosity. It isn't long before we ask ourselves "Why am I listening to this?"

Ham Radio has always been a family and community oriented group of people. Now a bully has crossed our path and is polluting our hobby. Sure, we can always change to another repeater, right? Wrong! These people are like the school bully. They will not go away if you give them what they want, because they will want more the next time, and the next, and the next. It will take longer for them to come to Simi. We are a low coverage repeater and that makes us less attractive than other repeaters. But be assured

that they will come.

If that does not sound bad enough, think about this. There are commercial interests who would love to take our bands and use them for their own profit. If you need proof, look at the history of band allocations for ham radio. Most recently look at what happened to the 220 MHz band. These commercial interests will quickly point to the trash in ham radio as an example of why these bands should be taken away from us.

The worst part is that they are growing in numbers. As new hams discover this darker side of Ham Radio they will think that it must be OK to do. Many will join in. This phenomenon is not exclusive to the VHF/UHF bands. It can be heard on the HF bands as well. And it is not just Technician class operators, there are plenty of General, Advanced, and Extra class operators among them. So now what do we do, you might ask. I don't have any sure fire answers. I am hoping that someone out there will have some ideas. If so, I would love to hear from you. Remember, the cancer is spreading. The larger it gets, the harder it will be to kill it.




